Happy 36th Birthday Barrington Land Conservation Trust. On March 26, 1979 the Barrington Land Conservation Trust was formed. It's been an incredible 35 years. So, where do we go from here?

Open space acquisition and protection is still our priority. We also want to ensure that the town's existing open spaces and protected areas are properly cared for and, whenever possible, open to the public.

A Fresh New Start.

For the past 35 years, the BLCT has worked quietly, but effectively to serve the community, however many are still not aware of all that we do and offer

to the public. An important goal for our future is to be accredited, which will open new opportunities for support from other land trust organizations, as well as new revenue to support our on-going work.

EDUCATE. Build Upon Youth Involvement Through Adult Programs.

The BLCT consistently offers a variety of programs for kids, students, and adults in our community. Our goal is to look for new and unique ways to educate our community about the valuable resources found right here in Barrington.

ENGAGE. Connect Community With Nature.

Barrington has very unique biodiversity of land, sea, and air. However, many of our residents are not aware of all that is available to them in their own backyard. The BLCT oversees more than 250 acres of protected land for our community to enjoy. We have begun work on a more robust community outreach program to engage residents with our properties, which will include an updated website complete with trail maps for some of our key properties.

URI VISITS NOCKUM HILL

A University of Rhode Island class of graduate and senior environmental science majors visited Nockum Hill on Hundred Acre Cove on April 15. The students, led by professor Nancy E. Karraker, studied periwinkles and a parasite they carry in order



to estimate the number of diamondback terrapins in the area. The land trust has been performing an annual study of the threatened terrapins at the Rayner Refuge at Nockum Hill since 1990.

The Rayner Refuge is the only managed and established turtle nesting ground for the diamondback terrapin in Rhode Island. The diamondback terrapin is listed as state endangered and protected.

CONGRATULATIONS TO HELEN TJADER



Former BLCT board member and past-president Helen Tjader was the recipient of the prestigious Peter B. Merritt Award for Conservation at the annual Land & Water Conservation Summit held at the University of Rhode Island on March 14.

The award recognizes individuals making outstanding contributions to their communities. Among

her many accomplishments with conservation and environmental causes, Helen served as BLCT president for five years and as president of the town Conservation Commission. She was a leader with the Rhode Island Chapter of the Sierra Club and a planner of several statewide environmental programs.

Helen currently runs the Barrington Town Trails Team, overseeing events and year-round maintenance of local walking trails. She is an expert on local Indian history. One of her current initiatives is establishing a Sowams National Heritage District made up of a wooded corridor that preserves the legacy of the Pokanoket Tribe in Rhode Island and Massachusetts

Helen's many accomplishments with the land trust include the acquisition of Sowams Woods, a 12-acre property that had special significance to the Pokanoket Tribe. The purchase of the property by the land trust took a great deal of coordination of finding federal, state, town and private sources.

Sowams Woods is located on Washington Road and is open to the public year round.
