Record Year for Terrapins

"Unusual" and "remarkable" describe the 23rd year of the Barrington Land Conservation Trust's diamondback terrapin project.

The hands-on study of terrapin egg nesting at the Doug Rayner Wildlife Sanctuary and the newborn turtle march to Hundred Acre Cove saw record numbers in 2012.

- · Earliest start for egg laying on May 26
- 179 female nesting terrapins
- 390 hatchlings released

From May through September, some 20 volunteers, students, researchers and many more friends and family members teamed up to count nesting diamondback terrapins, secure eggs and release hatchlings.

The 83-acre Doug Rayner refuge at Nockum Hill is Rhode Island's only established terrapin nesting ground. Nockum Hill is open to the public all year for hiking, birding, and class field trips. Efforts are underway to list the site on the National Register of Historic Places. The diamondback terrapin is classified as state endangered.
