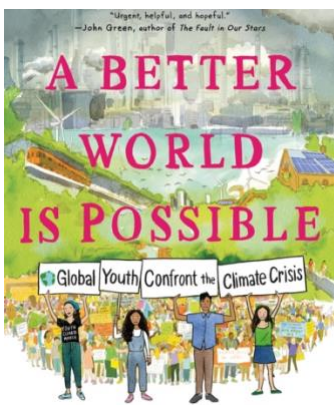


### **Land Trust Learning Series: Lessons from Dragonflies & Damselflies**

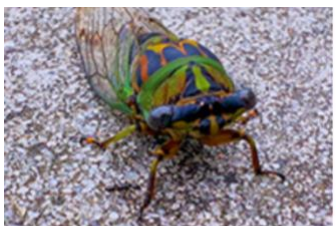


### **Combining Art and Science to Save Species**
